5. Minutes from the September 27th General Membership Meeting

6:20 pm – Assemble and Mingle.

6:36 pm – President Greg Lyman called the meeting to order. Recording of the meeting began.

Present: This was the ECDC's first hybrid meeting. Eleven people were present on Zoom. Seven were present in-person at Hana Gardens.

Minutes

Dwight Merrill notified the club that openings for Stege Sanitary District directors will be by appointment as there are three seats open and only three candidates. The race will not be on the November ballot as previously reported. After clarification that the information regarding the race was in the ECDC monthly newsletter rather than in the minutes, Ed Crowley moved and Dwight Merrill seconded a motion to approve the minutes of August 22, 2022 meeting as presented; motion passed unanimously.

Officer Reports

Treasurer: Ed Crowley reported \$12,733.33 in the bank account. No substantial changes from last month.

Membership: Neil Tsutsui reported a total of 183 members.

Programs: Carolyn Wysinger announced that the club's annual dinner will be on Saturday, October 22, at Los Moles restaurant from 6pm to 9pm. The keynote speaker will be Fiona Ma. The speaker portion of the event will be available on Zoom.

(**Note**: The October annual dinner was subsequently cancelled as California State Treasurer Fiona Ma had a schedule conflict and was no longer able to attend.)

Publications: William Ktsanes requested that members keep sending articles for the newsletter.

Media: Madeline Kronenberg was not present.

Records: Jonee had nothing to report.

DPCCC Report

Champagne Brown reported that the DPCCC met on September 15th and focused on getting out the vote (GOTV). The kick-off of the GOTV campaign in El Cerrito will be on October 8th to distribute DPCCC and El Cerrito materials. Michael Nye reported that Ben Therriault is running for Martinez City Council.

Diversity Committee

Buddy Akacic encouraged everyone to read Elijah Cummings' book We Are Better Than This.

Walk Piece for El Cerrito

Greg Lyman announced that 5,000 copies of the club's materials are being printed. Volunteers are needed to help bundle and deliver the materials to homes. Contact Greg for more information on volunteering.

Program

Carolyn Wysinger introduced Dr. Kenneth "Chris" Hurst, Sr., Superintendent of the West Contra Costa Unified School District (WCCUSD). Dr. Hurst described the strategic plan for the WCCUSD which includes the development of an equity statement, core values, and goals. He indicated the plan has been discussed in community meetings and is being presented to the School Board for feedback. Dr. Hurst reported that while staff shortages have been reduced, there are still sixteen unfilled positions. Associate Superintendent LaResha Martin Huffman described a grant of \$29.5 million that the district received for the Community Schools Partnership Program. She hopes to improve the admission rate of WCCUSD students to the University of California system. Dr. Hurst introduced Mr. Booker who manages the district's COVID and physical safety strategies. Each school has a "safety tracker" through which the school is monitored and offered safety support. Staff member Dr. McEntire reviewed the finances of the district. He reported that the financial picture is looking better than it did a few

months ago due in part to increases in cost-of-living allowances and a recovery fund of approximately \$38 million. For the first time since 2011, the State will contribute funding for transportation to help make the schools more accessible to students. Club members asked how the district plans to address the increase in the number of children who will arrive with the new housing being built in El Cerrito. Dr. McEntire said the district works with a demographer to study developments and growth in school enrollment. A determination is then made whether to build a new school, re-open an old school, or expand an existing school. A club member asked about the difference between charter and non-charter schools both academically and financially. The response was that the amount given per student is the same for both, but the district loses about \$5,000 per student who leaves for a charter school. The speakers did not have information regarding academic differences but offered to get that information for the Club. Many questions were asked about reading and math proficiency scores, which are lower for African-American and Latinx students. Dr. Hurst said it is why he is focused on the strategic planning to correct this long-standing and very concerning situation. Two WCCUSD trustees, Leslie Reckler and Jamela Smith-Folds, were present. The Club thanked all of the speakers for their hard work for our children and our schools.

ECDC Members Targeting Close State and National Races

Neil Tsutsui reviewed some of the California races for the U.S. House of Representatives that are very close and could be won by Democratic candidates Josh Harder, Rudy Salas, Christy Smith, and Adam Gray. Ed Crowley moved and Leslie Reckler seconded a motion that the Club take Neil's suggestion to highlight these candidates and encourage club members to expend their person efforts to support them. The motion passed unanimously. Information about the candidates will appear on the ECDC Facebook page.

Good of the Order

The club's check for \$200 was not received by the DPCCC in time to support their Annual BBQ, but the club will nonetheless donate the funds to the DPCCC as planned. Michael Nye reported that no Republicans have responded to the seminars on hot races offered by California Reliance for Retired Americans ("CARA"). Linda Cain asked that in the future speakers explain the acronyms used. Cheryl Sudduth announced National Disability Employment Awareness Month and an upcoming presentation to the Board of Supervisors. She also indicated that she will soon provide details about a statewide campaign to encourage pledges to limit water use.

6. Program: Election Recap and Discussion with Katie Ricklefs, Democratic Party of Contra Costa County Chair

Democratic Party of Contra Costa County (DPCCC) Chair Katie Ricklefs will join us at our General Membership Meeting on November 22nd to recap and discuss the November 8th election results (aka “The Red Wave that Wasn’t”).

Ms. Ricklefs’ professional career has spanned almost three decades working as an administrator with Kaiser Permanente (KP) in Northern California. As an executive in four different medical centers and a director in KP’s regional offices, she was devoted to working closely with labor and management to improve and expand quality health care in communities throughout Northern California. Her twenty-year volunteer career has focused on reproductive rights



and access to quality health care for all vulnerable populations, especially women and their families. Ms. Ricklefs has served on the board of Planned Parenthood Northern California and the Planned Parenthood Northern California Action Fund, which advocates for safe and legal access to Planned Parenthood services and for funding and laws that support affordable family planning and comprehensive reproductive and sexual health education.

Ms. Ricklefs is a 2008 Emerge California graduate who has also been very active in local and statewide Democratic groups. She served as President of the Lamorinda Democratic Club for six years, was elected to the Democratic Party Central Committee from District 2, and served as 1st Vice-Chair from 2018 through 2020. She is currently the Chair of the Democratic Party of Contra Costa County, where she represents, serves and advocates on behalf of over 370,000 Democrats with widely divergent views and experiences. (Earlier in the year, after witnessing her adept leadership skills in action during an online DPCCC “Zoom” meeting with nearly 100 participants, I sent an appreciative note admiring her ability to “herd donkeys.”)

7. ECDC Endorsements and November 8th Election Results

Before most elections I spend quite a bit of time researching candidates and issues as I decide for whom I'll vote and, if outside my district, who I want to win but for whom I cannot vote. Once the votes are cast, though, I often lose track of who "won" and "lost," particularly in close races with final tallies coming in slowly and in local races not widely reported by news outlets. For those of you who, like me, may have also "lost track," below is a recap of ECDC's endorsements and how each proposition and candidate fared. At the end are also updates on a few out-of-the-area California congressional races we expected to be close and are following.
