# ***TYPES OF PROPOSITIONS***

## **BI Bond Issue**

When state or local government (city, county, school district), places a question before the voters as a ballot measure, asking them to approve or deny additional proposed spending.

## **CISS Citizen Initiated Ballot Measure**

Citizen initiated ballot measure that amends state statutes.

## **LCRA legislatively referred constitutional amendment**

Legislative referral that amends the state's constitution. California Legislatures are required to seek voter approval to amend the state constitution.

# ***PUBLIC EDUCATION FACILITIES BOND MEASURE***

\$10 billion bond to pay for repairs and upgrades at thousands of K-12 school and community college buildings across California, some of which have languished for years with dry rot, mold, leaks and other hazards due to lack of funds. K-12 schools would get \$8.5 billion and \$1.5 billion would go to community colleges.

- ✔ Supports issuing \$10 billion in bonds to fund construction and modernization of public education facilities.

# ***RIGHT TO MARRY AND REPEAL PROP 8***



**A constitutional amendment to:  
repeal Proposition 8 (2008), which defined  
marriage as a union between one man and one  
woman, and declare that a "right to marry is a  
fundamental right" in the California Constitution.**



Amends the state constitution which will repeal Prop 8 (2008) that defined marriage as a union between man/woman. Declares that the right to marry is a fundamental right in CA





a no vote will not amend the state constitution and the wording from prop 8 will remain.



# ***PARKS, ENVIRONMENT, ENERGY, AND WATER BOND MEASURE***

**Authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10 billion to finance projects for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart, sustainable, and resilient farms, ranches, and working lands, park creation and outdoor access, and clean air programs.**

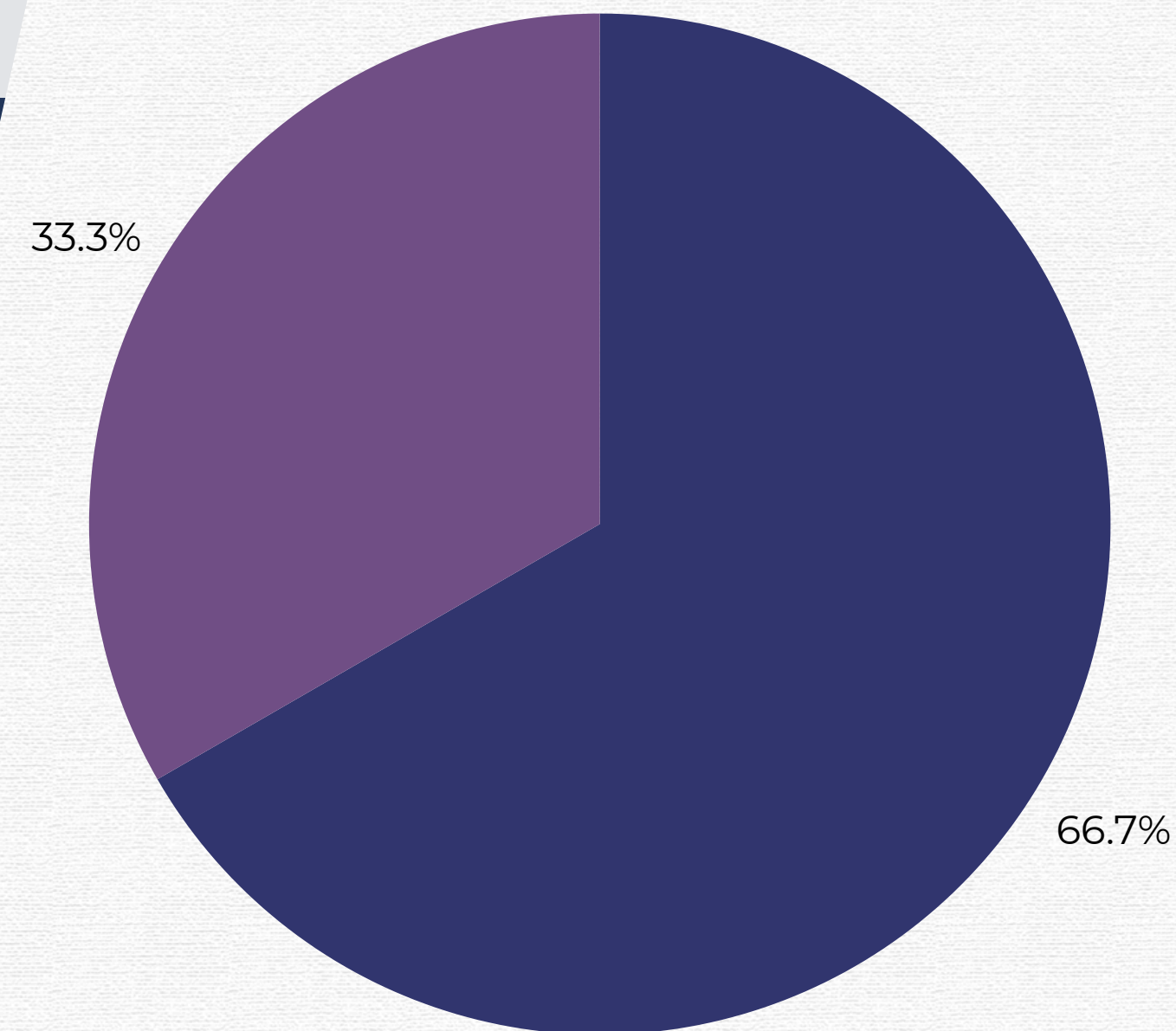

# ***LOWER SUPERMAJORITY REQUIREMENT TO 55% FOR LOCAL BOND MEASURES TO FUND HOUSING AND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE AMENDMENT***

Proposition 5  
LRCA

Constitutional amendment that would lower the supermajority vote requirement from two-thirds (66.67%) vote to 55% for local jurisdictions to issue bonds for affordable housing and public infrastructure projects.

# ***REMOVE INVOLUNTARY SERVITUDE AS PUNISHMENT FOR CRIME AMENDMENT***

**Repeal language prohibiting involuntary servitude except to punish crime and replace it with language prohibiting slavery and involuntary servitude absolutely.**

**Prohibits the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation from disciplining any incarcerated person for refusing a work assignment but authorize the department to award credits to incarcerated persons who voluntarily participate in work assignments**

-  Amends the state constitution to prohibit slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for a crime and authorize the awarding of credits to incarcerated persons who voluntarily participate in work assignments.

# ***\$18 MINIMUM WAGE***

**Increases the state minimum wage to \$18 an hour over several years. For employers with 26 or more workers, the minimum wage would reach \$18 on January 1, 2025. For employers with 25 or less workers, the minimum wage would reach \$18 on January 1, 2026. After reaching \$18, the minimum wage will annually adjust for inflation.**

- Supports increasing the state minimum wage to \$18 per hour by 2026 for all employers and thereafter adjusting the rate annually by increases to the cost of living.

# ***PROHIBIT STATE LIMITATIONS ON LOCAL RENT CONTROL***

- Designed to repeal the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act enacted in 1995.
- The act prohibits rent control on single-family homes and houses completed after February 1, 1995.
- The act also prohibits rent control laws that mandate what a landlord can charge a tenant when they first move in.

✔ Repeals Costa-Hawkins, allowing cities and counties to limit rent on any housing and limit the rent for first-time tenants and

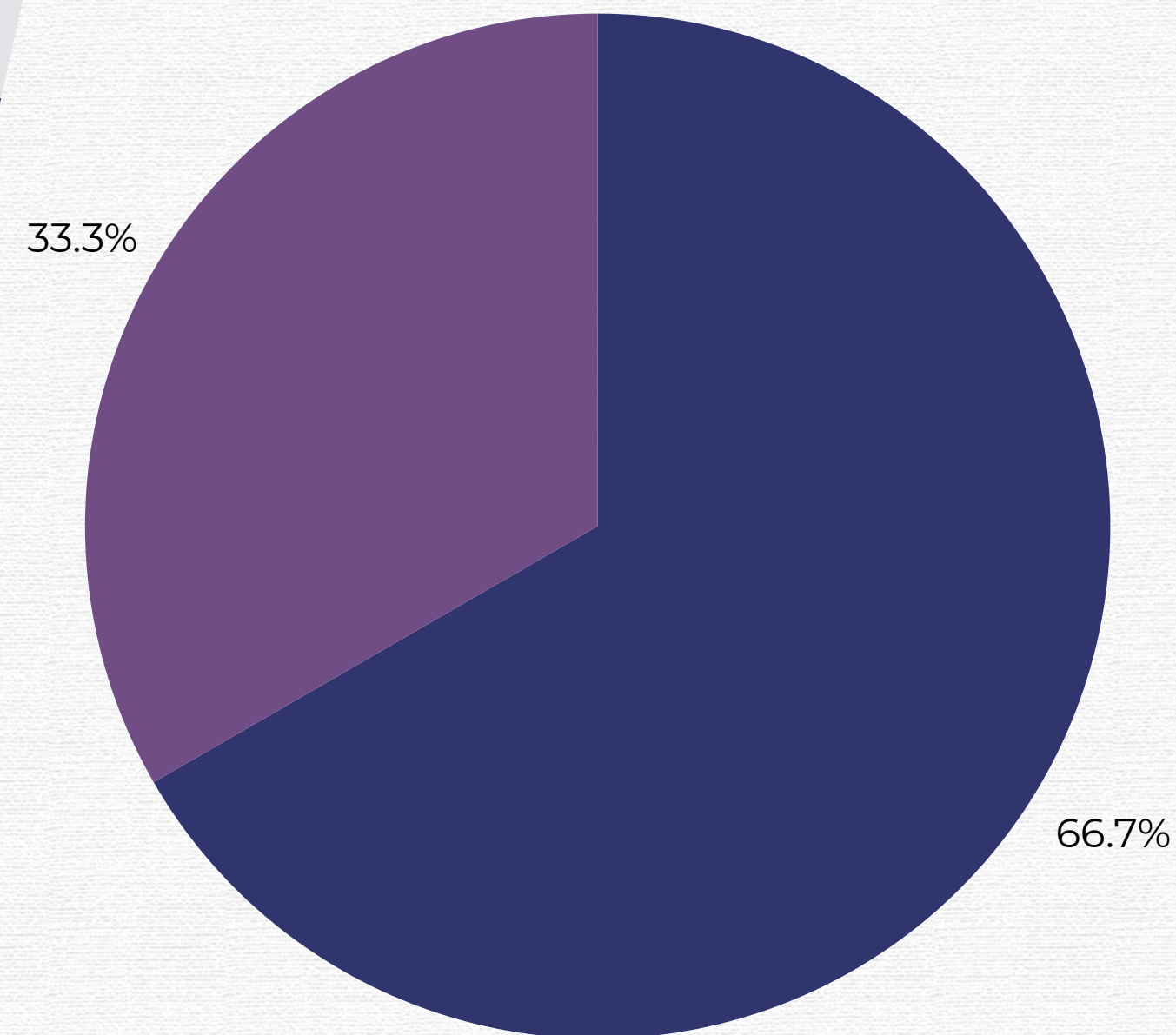

# ***LOWER SUPERMAJORITY REQUIREMENT TO 55% FOR LOCAL BOND MEASURES TO FUND HOUSING AND PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE AMENDMENT***

Proposition 34  
CISS

Constitutional amendment that would lower the supermajority vote requirement from two-thirds (66.67%) vote to 55% for local jurisdictions to issue bonds for affordable housing and public infrastructure projects.



Lowers the vote threshold from 66.67% to 55% for local bond measures to fund housing projects and public infrastructure.



Will maintain the voting threshold at 66.67%.

# MANAGED CARE ORGANIZATION TAX AUTHORIZATION



Makes a current tax on managed health care insurance plans permanent, which is supposed to end in 2026. The money from this tax is used to provide health care services to low-income families, seniors, people with disabilities, and others in the Medi-Cal program.



Permanently authorize a tax on managed care organizations based on monthly enrollees, which is set to expire in 2026, and requiring revenues to be used for increased Medi-Cal programs.



Opposes permanently authorizing a tax on managed care organizations based on monthly enrollees, thereby allowing it to expire in 2026.



# ***DRUG AND THEFT CRIME PENALTIES AND TREATMENT- MANDATED FELONIES***

Proposition 36  
CISS

**Increases penalties for certain drug crimes by increasing sentence lengths and level of crime. The initiative would also add fentanyl to the list of drugs (cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine) that would warrant a felony charge if an individual possesses one of the listed drugs and a loaded firearm.**

- ✔ A YES vote will making changes to Proposition 47 approved in 2014, including:
  - classifying certain drug offenses as treatment-mandated felonies;
  - increasing penalties for certain drug crimes by increasing sentence lengths and level of crime;
  - requiring courts to warn individuals convicted of distributing illegal drugs of their potential future criminal liability if they distribute deadly drugs like fentanyl, heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine.
  
- ✘ A NO vote opposes this initiative and will make no changes to Proposition 47 (2014), thereby maintaining certain drug and theft crimes as misdemeanors.
